

What is Customary Care?

- Nation cultural belief system. It is an agreement that recognizes and respects inherent rights of the First Nation. Customary Care agreements will be implemented only if a child is deemed in need of protection, as identified through a Child Welfare Authority or the Courts and the respective First Nation community declares the child(ren) be cared for under a Customary Care agreement, through a Band Council Resolution.
- Our historical practices are the foundation to customary care in the 21st century.



Together, the parents, Band Representative and Children and Family Services Agency decide on a suitable family to help raise the child.



- Parental rights are maintained, connection and the relationship with the child are preserved.
- Court proceedings are not required.
- Children remain with their extended family and within their community.
- The relationship between the child(ren), parent, and community is valued and respected.
- Community based decision making
